feed all 600 children and the farm workers their daily staple food. Of course we want to grow other crops to supplement the Posho—beans, cabbage, watermelon. Maybe even some tomatoes although they are quite labor intensive. The current harvest will be available to sell to the public for profit. We are excited! That is the next step for the farm.
